<b>Prayer</b>
1. Differentiate the four types of prayer: petition, adoration, contrition, and thanksgiving.
2. Analyze and recite the mysteries of the Rosary.
3. Explain why it is important to integrate prayer into our daily lives.
4. Recognize the difference between formal and informal prayer.
5. Recite by heart the following prayers: Rosary (all mysteries), Prayer for the Dead (Eternal Rest ...), and Divine Praises.
6. Know by heart the following prayers (learned in previous grades): Sign of the Cross, Our Father, Hail Mary, Grace before & after meals, Glory Be to the Father, Guardian Angel Prayer, Morning Offering, Act of Contrition, Mass Responses/Aclamations, Apostle's Creed, Prayer of St. Francis, Angelus, and Hail Holy Queen.
<b>Sacraments</b>
1. Identify the signs, symbols, matter, form, and effects of each of the seven sacraments.
2. Analyze the sacramentals and language used during the celebration of each of the seven sacraments.
3. Recognize that through the Sacrament of Confirmation, one "shares more completely in the mission of Jesus Christ and the fullness of the Holy Spirit." (CCC1294)
4. Describe how the Sacrament of Confirmation affirms one's Baptismal promises and brings Catholics into full Communion with the Church.
5. Explain that the Anointing of the Sick and Reconciliation are the two Sacraments of Healing in which God forgives and strengthens us.
6. Identify the circumstances when one can receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick.
7. Explain that Matrimony and Holy Orders are the Sacraments of Commitment/Vocation/Service.
8. Recognize that marriage is a sacrament of exclusive lifelong love, commitment, and covenant between a couple (man and woman) and God.
9. Identify the couple and God as the principal ministers of the Sacrament of Matrimony.
10. Identify the recipients and principal ministers of the Sacrament of Holy Orders.
11. Explain the role and importance of ordained ministers in the life of the Church (deacon, priest, and bishop).
12. Recognize that an ordained man is marked forever to serve as Christ's representative.
<b>Church</b>
1. Describe how the seven sacraments support us on our journey from birth to eternal life.
2. Identify the Mass as the Church's greatest prayer of praise and thanksgiving.
3. Describe when Transubstantiation takes place within the context of the Mass.
4. Identify the structure and proper sequence of the Mass from the Introductory Rite to the Concluding Rite.
5. Explain why the Mass is the universal Sacrifice of Christ.

<b>Scripture</b>
1. Analyze the Gospel stories mediated upon in the Mysteries of the Rosary.
2. Recall Scripture passages related to each of the seven sacraments.
3. Classify Psalms by their category: primarily praise, thankfulness, and lamentations.
4. Recognize Psalms as part of the Liturgy of the Word.
<b>Creed/Doctrine</b>
1. Discuss how the seven sacraments are tangible signs that give grace, have been instituted by Christ and are celebrated by His Church.
2. Explain the meaning of Transubstantiation as the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.
<b>Moral Formation</b>
1. Recognize that the change of heart is a necessary step of reconciliation.
2. State the three conditions necessary for mortal sin: grave matter, full knowledge, and deliberate content.
3. Explain how the Commandments and Beatitudes can be used for an examination of conscience.
4. Recognize that all are called to continue the ministry of reconciliation in their lives.
5. Discuss how to form a good conscience.
6. Explain the difference between perfect and imperfect contrition. (CCC 1452-1453)
7. Evaluate good and bad choices in given life situations.

1. Demonstrate Christian values in one's daily interactions with others
2. Identify the seven areas of Catholic Social Teaching: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Life and Dignity of the Human Person</li> <li>• Call to Family, Community, and Participation</li> <li>• Rights and Responsibilities</li> <li>• Option for the Poor and Vulnerable</li> <li>• Dignity of Work and Rights of Workers</li> <li>• Solidarity</li> <li>• Care for God's Creation</li> </ul>
